Letter from the President



Thank you to everyone who responded to our survey about where we should be focusing our attention and how we might recruit more members for AAUW. The responses are shown in a separate article elsewhere in this *Grapevine*; the results will affect our planning and programming for the coming year.

April promises to be a busy month for the branch. At our annual **Potluck Luncheon** on April 18 you can meet our Local Scholarship recipients who are transferring from West Valley College to four-year colleges or universities, and you will hear from Elizabethe Manzi, one of the women who received funding from the Association for her graduate level studies. The **English Tea** on April 25 raises money for the Committee on Homeless Women and Children and for our Local Scholarships. The hospitality students from Mission College will provide delicious food, and the silent auction and jewelry tables will offer many interesting items for

purchase. You'll see first-hand the impact that AAUW's support has had on women's lives. Invite some friends to join you and learn more about AAUW and about our local projects; tickets are \$45 each.

Some follow-up notes: Our Authors' Lunch on January 21 showcased three very different local women who continue to affect our local community and other parts of the world. Erica Goss (Los Gatos Poet Laureate), David Perez (Poet Laureate of Santa Clara County) and Jennifer Swanton Brown (Poet Laureate of Cupertino) have started a summer camp designed to teach video poetry to teen-aged girls. Anthropologist (and Harley rider) Barbara Joans reported that her class for "older women" has 50 women attending, which exceeded her expectations. Lauri Pastrone sold enough copies of the cookbook "Share" to sponsor one woman through Women for Women International, and several members are considering their own sponsorship.



The Alzheimer's Association (our February 19 speaker) is holding its "Reason to Hope Luncheon" on April 30 with proceeds used to expand family services and education programs, as well as research. Details can be found on their website www.alz.org.

Right now WGP is providing a refuge for homeless women two afternoons a week; it plans to provide services five days a week. In addition to a safe place to gather, WGP plans to provide a hot meal, showers, clothes washing facilities, group activities, and needed social services for the women.

The 2015 Local Scholarship Recipients

The Local Scholarship Committee has selected three recipients for this year's scholarships.

There were seven applicants this year, and all of them were outstanding students. The committee had an impossible time determining only two winners. Thus, we decided to award three scholarships. **The three winners are:**

STEPHANIE HADLEY -

Stephanie's career goal is Astronautical Engineering and Astroparticle Physics. She transitioned from studying Fashion Design to Astronautical Engineering and Astroparticle Physics after watching documentaries that address guestions about the universe and research on the theories attempting to unify the articles and forces as well as the theoretical candidates for dark matter. She wants to embrace the innate human curiosity within, equipped with imagination, to ultimately contribute to scientific research.

Stephanie co-founded the Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) Club in 2014. She tutored in the Math Resource Center and in Tutorial Services. She volunteered at the UCO Lick Observatory. She was recently selected to travel to NASA's Johnson Space Center to participate in the NASA Community College Aerospace Scholars project. She was also selected as 1 of 5 out of 80 applicants to the University of California Santa Cruz Computational Astrophysics Fellowship to do original research under a mentor, Dr. Joel Primack, the man responsible for the modern model of the universe known as the

Lambda Cold Dark Matter Model. With the scholarship, she hopes to focus on her studies and continue making strides in her pursuit to contribute to the advancement of scientific technology and research. Stephanie plans to attend San Jose State University in the Fall of 2015.

HANIEH SEPASIAN -

Hanieh's dream of majoring in Biology developed at an early age. She always wanted to help people feel better. Hanieh left everything familiar behind when her family moved from Iran to the United States. She did not know a word of English. She was forced to grow up and look for a job since she is the sole provider for her family.

Her goal is to become a surgeon. She wants to bring positive change into the lives of people. She brought her passion and dream throughout her experience at West Valley College. She worked as an intern for two doctors and volunteered for a Healthy Living program. Growing up in Iran, she experienced many hardships because she is a woman. However, here in this country Hanieh has been able to succeed through hard work and struggles. The scholarship will help her family as well as to fulfill her dream of working as a physician. Hanieh has applied to UC Santa Cruz for the Fall 2015 semester.

ELIZABETH MOSS -

Elizabeth's early experience with Mathematics was not good; she hated Math. She applied for services at West Valley College Disability Education Support Program (DESP). She was given an assessment for Learning Disabilities. A Math instructor became her mentor and asked Elizabeth to tutor within the Disabilities and Educational Support Program. A paid tutoring position within the program was offered to her. Her goal is not just to teach Math but to help as many people as possible obtain clarity with the learning process in any given subject.

Elizabeth began participating in the campus community and became the President of Voices Literary Magazine. She also was elected to be the secretary of the Inter Club Council. This spring she will be a supplemental instructor in the DESP department. It requires a model student to be present at all classes and act as a conduit between the classroom setting and the tutoring session. The scholarship will help her gain financial independence as she is working on three jobs. She is planning on transferring to UC Santa Cruz as a Mathematics major in the Fall of 2015. Her career goal is to be a Learning Specialist.

As you can see, we have three exceptional recipients. Each recipient will receive \$1,500 upon proof of enrollment in the Fall of 2015.

Los Gatos-Saratoga Member Survey Results


How well is the Los Gatos-Saratoga branch of AAUW meeting the expectations of its members?

The Board thought we should ask. Our survey was mailed to 156 members, and 70 (45%) responded by the March 9 deadline. This is an excellent response rate since many surveys gather only 5% or 6% response rate. Our members **care about AAUW** and appreciated our effort to ask them their opinion. The Board will be looking at the survey results when planning for next year.

1. Why do I remain an AAUW member?

The most important reason (52 responses) was the AAUW mission, closely followed by small interest groups (49) and our local projects (42). Somewhat less important were monthly meetings (25), local community involvement (22) and public policy (19). Other reasons cited included meeting like-minded women (4), socializing (2) and meetings with other branches (1).


So it's very important that we maintain our connection with the overall mission of promoting equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy and research, while connecting members to smaller groups and local project committees.



2. How many general monthly meetings should we have?


Most respondents (30 = 43%) thought that about every other month would be fine, while 16 (23%) thought we should continue to have a program every month and 14 (20%) preferred only 2 general meetings plus our 2 fundraising events. The other 10 (14%) had no opinion.

Maybe we have been putting too much time and effort into the monthly meetings – time and effort that could be better spent on supporting our small interest groups and local projects.



3. Where could we do a better job?

By far the biggest area where we could improve is visibility within the community (41 responses or 59%), followed distantly by adding some small groups (19 = 27%) and providing more information about our local projects (12 = 17%). Visibility was also mentioned as a way we could recruit more members so this could be a major branch effort in the coming year.

4. How can we recruit new members?

This was an open- ended question which generated several suggestions:

- Be more visible in the community: Advertise our meetings and events better, participate in community events, work with local Asian organizations, co-sponsor programs with other groups, ask local realtors to provide our materials
- Recruit new college graduates: Give them a membership, have AAUW information available on campuses, connect with our local high schools
- Encourage current members to bring new members: Bring a prospective member to an event or meeting, bring a prospective member to a small group or committee, invite daughters, granddaughters and other family members to join, carry an AAUW brochure with you
- Look for people who already know about AAUW: Parents of Tech Trek girls, West Valley College staff, Local Scholarship recipients, recently retired teachers
- Treat new members nicely: Introduce them at meetings, talk with them and not just people you already know, encourage them to bring their friends, get more feedback from them
- Possible recruiting events: Coffee/tea in someone's home, luncheon meetings, early evening "happy hour" for working women, a Young Professionals meeting
- Other ideas: Reduce the cost of membership, vary the times of meetings even for a small group, have a meeting to generate more ideas.

The best way to recruit new members is by **word of mouth** – YOUR mouth and MY mouth. People say they didn't join AAUW because they weren't invited so let's make sure that we invite them to join a great organization!
