**BO CALDWELL** 

Bo Caldwell grew up in Los Angeles and graduated from Stanford University, where she later held a Wallace Stegner Fellowship and a Jones Lectureship in Creative Writing. She has received a fellowship in literature from the National Endowment for the Arts, an Artist Fellowship from the Arts Council of Santa Clara County, the Georgia Shreve Prize in Fiction at Stanford University, and the Joseph Henry Jackson Award from the San Francisco Foundation. She lives in Northern California with her husband, novelist Ron Hansen.

Her second novel, *City of Tranquil Light*, published in 2010, was a Los Angeles Times bestseller, an October 2010 Indie Next Notable, and one of O Magazine's Ten Must Reads for October 2010.

Her first novel, The Distant Land of My Father, was first published in 2001. The book was a national bestseller, one of the Los Angeles Times' Best Books of 2001, and a Booksense 76. The book was also selected for community reading programs in Pasadena ("One City, One Story"), and Santa Clara County ("Silicon Valley Reads").



MARCIA KEMP STERLING

Marcia Kemp Sterling practiced law in Silicon Valley before turning to writing. With degrees from Vanderbilt University and Stanford Law School, she has been a newspaper reporter, high school teacher, law firm partner and software company general counsel. She grew up in Texarkana, Arkansas and lives with her husband in Palo Alto, California.

Her first book, *One Summer in Arkansas*, takes place in 1990. The stock markets are soaring and Lee Addison is on a fast track to success in Silicon Valley. Just out of law school with a job lined up at one of the best firms in the Bay Area.

But standing between him and his shining future is a promise to spend the summer back home in Riverton, Arkansas. He is unprepared for the siren pull his hometown still holds on his heart. To make matters worse, the allure of a rekindled relationship with Annie Rayburn threatens to disrupt his planned future.

This is a story of crisis and survival and the universal struggle to tap into values that will hold fast against the uncertainties of time.

**Dr. Audry Lynch**, from Massachusetts, earned a bachelors degree in English at Harvard in 1955. She married her husband Greg in 1956. While working and rearing her three children, she earned her masters in Counseling from Boston University in 1967. Moving to California in 1970, she worked as a guidance counselor in South San Jose and earned her doctorate degree in Educational Psychology at the University of San Francisco in 1984.

Living in California she pursued an interest in author John Steinbeck. After his death, on panels at various conferences and gatherings, she met school mates, close neighbors, his second wife, and even a travel companion.

Audrey's latest book is *The Development of Roy Simmonds as a Steinbeck Scholar as Evidenced Through His Letters:* The Life and Achievement of an Independent Academic (2010).

Other books about John Steinbeck are The Rebel Figure in American Literature and Film: The Interconnected Lives of John Steinbeck and James Dean (2009), and Steinbeck Remembered: Interviews with Friends and Acquaintances of John Steinbeck (2000).

## Honor Given to Tech Trek founder, Marie Wolbach

Marie Wolbach was one of five women named for the *National Classic Woman Award 2013*, sponsored by the Traditional Home magazine. She was honored for starting Tech Trek in 1998 with the help of a Community Action Grant and was able to use ISPF as her 501c3 foundation.

Tech Trek, the week long camp on campus at Stanford University has since grown to 10 camps on 8 campuses. This year AAUW had four other states with Tech Trek camps. A Classic Woman is, in this case, *"someone who saw a need to be addressed and started a volunteer program to address that need"*.

Several surprises at the luncheon were a gift of a silver cuff bracelet, Lenox place settings of their dinnerware "Butterfly Meadow" to be used in raising funds for Tech Trek and Lenox gave all attendees a porcelain condiment serving dish and a crystal candle holder.

### **Understanding the Civil War**

The November General Meeting was a great success with over 80 people attending the lecture. Santa Clara University history professor Robert Senkewicz (*pictured below*) gave us insights into how the American Civil War perception has changed over the 150 years since the battle of Gettysburg.



Here are a few changing perceptions made in Professor Senkewicz's presentation:

- The states, when they seceded, cited the preservation of slavery as one reason for their action. By the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary the stated reasons for secession were said to be states' rights and the role of the federal government.
- After the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary there was a critical alignment between the causes of the Civil War and the *"Civil Rights movement"* which fought against racial segregation, one of the legacies of the Civil War.
- Recent scholarship draws extensively on the ordinary soldiers' diaries and letters, such as Ken Burns used in his Civil War series. Now virtually all scholars agree that abolition of slavery was the primary, if not only, cause of the Civil War.
- From the beginning, women played an important role in the Abolitionist movement; many were also involved in the struggle for women's rights. Women on both sides also played important roles in medical care, not just in nursing, and in the north with fundraising for their cause.

The Saratoga Library co-sponsored the meeting with us. The library gathered a great display of materials about the Civil War on display at the entry to the adult area. Many thanks to Roslyn Donald and her library staff for all their help in making this event so successful.



## AAUW California Branches Take this Opportunity to Work on a Title IX Project

I have been talking with Kate Karpilow, Executive Director of the California Center for Research on Women and Families (CCRWF) about our collaboration related to Title IX – the goal is to support local groups of people, including AAUW CA branches, to assess Title IX compliance in public schools and to bring press and visibility to the results.

#### Here is how it will work.

CCRWF is the host of the Women's Policy Summit to be held on January 16, 2014 at the Sacramento Convention Center. This Summit will offer a training session to train attendees on how to assess Title IX compliance in the public schools — not a fullblown evaluation, but just an assessment of six priority indicators focusing on sports.

The training will be conducted by the California Women's Law

Center and, most likely, the Employment Law Center who worked with AAUW to develop our very own Program in a Box, Title IX: Know the Score. We have AAUW members employed as attorneys at both firms.

The AAUW CA goal is to inspire at least 10 AAUW CA branches to commit to evaluating the high schools in their own communities. These groups could be comprised of members of a local AAUW branch or a committed AAUW member who wants to take on a time-limited project with other community groups. Or, we hope that some AAUW CA branches and / or members will work with high school journalists or athletes so that the research on Title IX compliance can also become a mentoring opportunity.

**After the January 16 Summit**, the local teams will complete and

submit their assessments within a three month period. There will be online technical assistance in the forms of conference calls or email correspondence with the law firms involved in this effort.

Then, there will be a May hearing in Sacramento to release and publicize our results. We also will be assessing if there might be potential legislation as part of this effort.

**Your input is needed.** This is a project in development and we welcome your ideas and participation. There will be a call for local teams soon and I hope that you will use the next month to determine if your branch or some branch members will be a part of this exciting statewide effort. AAUW has supported Title IX for more than 41 years and this is a tremendous opportunity to continue that support.

There will also be an informational conference all about the project – stay tuned for an email invitation. Please discuss this project with your members soon so your branch will be ready to participate.
