Message from the March 2013 Chairwomen of the Month Committee

As we celebrate Women's History Month, I am reminded of how AAUW has worked for equity and education for women since 1881 and continues to open doors for women and girls. The Association website (www.aauw.org) has an online museum where their achievements in each decade of our history are chronicled along with information about the women who have lead the way to more equity for us all. *I will highlight a few of them here.*

- AAUW traces its roots back to a time when few women were allowed to attend college or to pursue a professional career. In 1881 Marion Talbot and Ellen Richards invited 15 exception alumnae who had graduated from 8 different colleges to gather in Boston and form the Association of College Alumnae (ACA) which would encourage more women to pursue a college degree. Wesleyan University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology were admitted as the first educational institution members in 1882.
- The first local Branches to affiliate with the ACA were Washington D.C. in 1884 and New York; Boston, Philadelphia and San Francisco in 1886. Branches were admitted if they supported the work of the Association, as is true today. The first research was a survey of the health of college women to prove wrong a prominent Boston physician who claimed that higher education would adversely affect women's health. In 1889 ACA established a membership policy for educational institutions which marked the beginning of using AAUW membership as a means for encouraging higher standards in the education of women.
- In 1890 Branches established Bureaus of Occupation to provide information on employment and pay differentials. In the early 1890s, a new Committee on Educational Legislation advocated for child labor laws, compulsory education, establishment of juvenile court, the abolition of child labor and funding for public schools and libraries. This was the forerunner of the AAUW legislative program.
- Jumping ahead to the 1990s there was still work to be done. The most extensive comparative study of self esteem levels, career and educational aspirations, and math & science interests of American boys and girls was commissioned, with results published in a report and follow up programs on Shortchanging Girls, Shortchanging America.

• After 7 years of support by AAUW Lobby Corps, the Family and Medical Leave Act was passed in 1993. In the same year the report Hostile Hallways: the AAUW Survey on Sexual Harassment in America's Schools was released. In 1994 support was given to the Elementary and Secondary Education Act which has numerous gender equity provisions proposed by AAUW in coalition with other groups and members of Congress.

I encourage you to visit the AAUW website and the Online Museum which is the source for all of the above. You will find much more detail and feel pride in the steady effort of our Association to achieve equity for all women and girls.

Please also plan to attend our Branch meeting on Saturday, March 16 (*see front page for details*) to learn from two young women who have empowered other women around the world and to celebrate Women's History Month.

Women's Economic Well-Being Lags Behind Men's – Report Confirms

According to a new report released by Legal Momentum, women still lag behind men in economic well-being. Although today women surpass men in educational attainment, men ages 21-30 are better off than women of the same age group based on eight measures of economic well-being, such as salary and employment rates.

These findings support the conclusions of AAUW's research on the pay gap; most recently, AAUW researchers found in *Graduating to a Pay Gap* that women working full time one year out of college earned an average of 82 cents for every dollar paid to their male peers.

Report on Closing the Wage Gap Equal Pay Day is April 9, 2013

One of the most important AAUW Public Policy Priorities is that women deserve "fairness in compensation, equitable access and advancement in employment, and vigorous enforcement of employment antidiscrimination statutes."

We are still not there! Published last October, the newest AAUW study shows that just one year out of college millennial women are paid 82 cents for every dollar paid to their male peers. Women are paid less than men even when they do the same work and major in the same field.

The AAUW report, *Graduating to a Pay Gap*, also found that 20 percent of women working full time one year after graduation devote more than 15 percent of their earnings to paying back college loans.

Equal Pay Day will be observed on April 9, 2013 - another year, another wage gap for women and their families. And with our inactive Congress and still-troubling economy, women feel the pinch of the wage gap, and there's not much being done about it.

An important step in closing the wage gap is for Congress to pass the *Paycheck Fairness Act*. It would help close some of the loopholes in the Equal Pay Act of 1963 that have made it less effective. Passage of the Paycheck Fairness Act is an AAUW focus in the 113th Congress. AAUW research allows us to say: *"There is a wage gap and here's the numbers to prove it."*

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Details about New 5-story Shelter on King Rd in San Jose English Tea and Silent Auction will be Saturday, April 27, 2013

Our February meeting speaker was Beth Leary, Executive Director, Family Supportive Housing. Beth became the new director when Trish Crowder retired. Beth comes from within the organization. She started working in the development department 9 years ago and has held many other jobs over the years.

New 5-story Building on King Road in San Jose. The building has space for 35 clients. The clients rooms, with private bath, are on the 3^{rd} , 4^{th} and 5^{th} floors. The on-site day care is up and running with 2 teachers, 4 babies and 8 — toddlers to school age. As part of the shelter, this day care program is not open to the community (*no* government funds are used).

Beth said that the outside area (with a memorial bench dedicated to Georgia Travis, Ann Dempsey and Bette Pestka) has a beautiful fountain, and is widely enjoyed by the clients.

Evening Programs include – a Homework Club, (*with new volunteers from Santa Clara University and San Jose State University – the* volunteers need to make a 3 month commitment), a Computer Lab, and even a wonderful Library. Other adult programs include Anger Management and Parenting classes. Families get to talk about their week, and what has worked and not worked at the House Meetings.

Good Fresh Food – Vania, a retired professional chef, is the program chef and only uses fresh produce. Second Harvest Food bank provides produce on Wednesday, on staples are provided on Friday. St. Francis of Assisi on Sunday sends the unsold food from their farmers market. Weekend meals are provided by outside groups.

Campership – Beth thanked us for our annual gift to the summer campership program. It is a life changing experience for the children at the shelter. They are provide with all new clothing and equipment for camping, so they fit in with the other children going to camp.

Help Needed – Donations can be dropped off from 10:00 am - 4:00 pm. Sheets and towels are always needed.

Families take all the supplies in their room when moving.
