

Letter from the President

I hope to see you at our Silver English Tea and Silent Auction fundraiser on Saturday afternoon, March 29, at West Valley College (see front page and flyer for details). Proceeds benefit our three local projects: Tech Trek science/math camp at Stanford University; Local Scholarships for women transferring from West Valley College to a four-year college; and the Committee on Homeless Women and Children which supports agencies working with homeless women and their families. Speakers from each program will talk about the impact our support has made on their lives.

The talented students from the Hospitality Management Department of Mission College, under the direction of Chef Instructor Scott Brunson, will offer a variety of delicious sandwiches and tasty desserts for your enjoyment.

New this year: You will be able to use your credit card for Silent Auction and jewelry purchases through PayPal. There will be plenty of interesting items and plenty of time to look at them all.

In addition to the Silver English Tea, another great event in March will be Lily Ledbetter as the keynote speaker for the South Bay Women's Conference on Saturday, March 8, at San Jose State University (see page 5 for details). Tickets can be purchased through the conference website www.southbaywc.org/registration/including tickets for just the keynote. Lily became the symbol of the effort to require equal pay for equal work and is the namesake of the Ledbetter Fair Pay Restoration Act, the first bill signed into law by President Obama in 2009.

Equal pay is only one part of AAUW's advocacy efforts in Washington, spearheaded by Lisa Maatz who spoke in February at DeAnza College about her role as AAUW's chief policy adviser. Lisa outlined the advocacy/lobbying process, noting that AAUW selects 2 or 3 major issues to address each session. AAUW provides valuable non-partisan research on its positions and has earned such a solid reputation that people "take our calls" and pay attention to our positions. We may not win every issue but Lisa and her staff members keep AAUW advocating for equity for women and girls.

Our Nominating Committee is looking for members to lead our branch next year. Under the direction of Geri Williams they have already filled some of the positions and ask you to consider serving as a branch officer for 2014-2015. 

Another Successful Author's Luncheon in January!

Our annual Authors' Luncheon was held Thursday, January 23, 2014, at the Rinconada Country Club in Los Gatos. Branch members and their guests along with members representing other local branches were in attendance. The lunch was particularly tasty this year - and, of course, the staff at Rinconada did an impeccable job welcoming us.

The highlight of the luncheon was the talk given by each author after being introduced by Patty Weber.

Audry Lynch spoke of the poet, Robinson Jeffers. She became interested in learning more about him after visiting his house in Carmel and meeting with one of his twin sons, Garth. With her talent for bringing her audience into the life of an author, Audry's retelling of the love story between Robinson and Una captivated us. She told of how important Una was in his life, as companion, organizer and maintainer of their privacy as he became more famous. Their 'bohemian' lifestyle seemed fascinating.

Marcia Kemp Sterling was our second speaker. She told us of her interesting and diverse background, meeting both setbacks and successes - how she worked to become a prominent lawyer, then had to deal with the reality of losing her voice. She was able to continue her successes and eventually "retire" and write a book: One Summer in Arkansas, drawing on her career as a successful Silicon Valley lawyer and on her childhood in a small town in Arkansas. She spoke of her emphasis on character over plot and told how her characters "became themselves" as the story progressed.

Bo Caldwell rounded out the trio of authors - She experienced success in writing while in school, thanking her teachers for their encouragement. Bo's writing ability enabled her to make an income from business writing. Her first novel, *Distant Land of My Father*, was published in 2001 and was based on

experiences of her uncle in China. She related the interesting story of how she became a friend of this uncle as an adult, how she became the owner of his memoirs, and then how she put these experiences into a narrative. Bo's continuing habit is to write fragments of a novel, keeping these on file, then revisiting them, trying to see connectors. She hadn't been having much success doing this, but then she 'heard a voice' telling her to go back to China - and she did - using stories told her of her grandparents' experiences as missionaries. The result is her second novel, *City of Tranquil Light*, published in 2010.

Throughout her talk, she referred to 'left turns' in her life - and how these have affected her professionally and personally.




Energizing AAUW California Convention

Title IX COALITION

We have joined a coalition of California women's organizations to increase compliance with Title IX – and open up opportunities for girls! AT itle IX Check Listhas been developed to assess T itle IX implementation in local high schools – focusing in onpriority indicators and best practices in three important areas covered under Title IX: athletics, sexual harassment, and pregnant teens.

Although Title IX is best known for breaking down barriers in athletics, it also protects students from sexual harassment and requires fair treatment for pregnant and parenting students, among many provisions.

Are you interested in learning more or signing up to help with this effort? Sign upfor a webinar that will offer training on how use the **Title IX Check List**.

Afterwards, technical assistance will be available through the Legal Aid Society – Employment Law Center, Equal Rights Advocates, and AAUW of California.

And, thanks to a partnership with **Senator Hannah-Beth Jackson**, our local partners will have an opportunity to present the results of their Title IX assessments at alegislative hearing.

Join us as we work together to ensure that Title IX is implemented — and help open up doors and opportunities for girls and young women!
