

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## Letter from the Leadership Team



### **AAUW Has Been Working for Women for 135 Years!**

This month marks the 135 anniversary of AAUW. On November 28, 1881, Marion Talbot and Ellen Richards met in Boston with 15 alumnae representing eight colleges to discuss the needs of college-educated women. In addition to broadening opportunities and assisting other women in higher education, they discussed the formation of the Association of Collegiate Alumnae, the predecessor to the American Association of University Women or AAUW.

The first organizational meeting was held on January 14, 1882. At this meeting 65 alumnae of eight colleges drafted the Articles of Incorporation, which outline the purpose of the organization:

"For practical education work, for collection and publication of statistical and other information concerning education, and in general, for the maintenance of high standards of education."

In 1885 the Association of Collegiate Alumnae issued its **first research** 

report in conjunction with the Massachusetts Bureau of Statistics of Labor. The report, *Health Statistics of Women College Graduates*, established that, contrary to popular belief, women's health is not adversely affected by attending college.

#### First fellowship granted

AAUW's tradition of supporting women's education began when **Ida Street** received the first fellowship from the Western Association of Collegiate Alumnae, one of the predecessor organizations of AAUW, in 1888. Considered a "woman of rare culture and accomplishments," Street studied at the University of Michigan for two years and contributed essays and poems to numerous periodicals, including the New Englander.

In 1920 **Marie Curie**, a future Nobel Prize-winning scientist, received contributions from American women, including



ACA members, toward the purchase of one gram of radium in order to continue her research. Curie's daughter later returned a portion of unused money to AAUW, which used it to create the endowment that funds the Marie Curie Postdoctoral Fellowship.

Today, after 135 years, AAUW has more than 170,000 members and supporters across the United States, 1,000 local branches and over 800 college and university partners.

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# Humanitarian and Guiding Light to the Homeless Committee Members Remembering Georgia Travis

I was privileged to speak at the renaming of the "Commercial Street Inn", the overnight shelter for women and children. Now under the Life Moves agency, the shelter will be known as the **Georgia Travis House**. On August 24, 2016 the ribbon-cutting ceremony was held; many community dignitaries and politicians attended. I was asked to speak about Georgia since many long-time Committee on Homeless Women & Children members knew her well.

A favorite "Georgia story" took place during her student years at the University of Chicago. She had very little money and depended on a small stipend for food. One semester the stipend didn't arrive so for four days she went hungry. She wrote that she had to slept on her stomach at night to lessen the pangs. Her bus to class stopped in front of a restaurant and she had to wait. Looking in the window and seeing everyone eating, she wrote, "I thought they were pigs and I hated them all and I hated the whole world. I never forgot what it was like to be hungry."

In the middle of the great depression, she began her medical social work in 1932 Chicago. For over forty years she worked in federal, state, and local public welfare and health agencies. She spent a year teaching at the University of Sydney, Australia as a Fulbright scholar. Until retirement she was a professor of graduate level social work at San Diego State. She authored journal articles, textbooks and her biography, "Round Peg, Round Hole".

Georgia had a knack for spotting a problem and setting about solving it, no matter how complex it might be, making her unique. She was a master at enlisting people around her – many of whom never thought to become

involved. As JoAn Lambert said, "It was not a good idea to introduce a new problem as you would find yourself chairman of a committee to solve it!"

Georgia initiated an important program while working as a medical social worker in Seattle, Washington . She learned that sick Eskimo children were flown from Alaska to the hospital for surgery with, no family member, only a medical attendant. Going to a local Congressman, she received funding for flights and housing so that a family member could come along.

Georgia viewed anyone working in the U.S. Congress and in any state or local legislature as being there to provide financing for needed programs. She boldly approached them and was unrelenting. She would attend every one of their at home "Town Meetings". Looking out in the audience they saw her sitting there, and were reminded the homeless needed their help.

For those of us on the Committee she was a driving force. At one meeting I asked for a show of hands "how many of us received regular phone calls from her to do some task she had thought of". We all raised our hands. One of our Committee members joked, "Thank goodness she didn't have a cell phone."

Three days before Georgia died I sat with her for a while. She decried her approaching death as she still had so much yet to do. To lighten her mood I asked if Heaven was warned of her coming. I mused about the number of "heavenly" committees she could convene. We named off some fine members she could enroll. She put her head back and laughed and laughed at this delightful prospect. But I think Heaven has found out it was no laughing matter.

Our Committee has done more for this community than any of us ever thought we could. Georgia Travis never had a doubt.

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## Single-payer Health Care, What Do You Know?

This is a second in a series of articles on Myths &Lies about Single-Payer Health Care

- Myth Single payer leads to rationing, like in Canada. **Wrong** – Right now in the United States, the private health insurance companies ration care. If you don't have health insurance, you don't get health care. More than 30 million Americans currently lack health insurance. That is why 120 Americans die every day from lack of health care. There are some problems in the Canadian system, but most of what you hear about long lines is health insurance industry propaganda. Zero people die every day in Canada due to lack of health insurance.
- Myth Costs will skyrocket under single payer.
  Wrong – Single payer is the only health care reform that will save
- enough money to insure everyone. By eliminating the health insurance industry we would save \$350 + billion a year in administrative costs and profits. We could use that money to insure those who lack insurance and fully cover those who are under-insured. Yes, more people will be seeking health care because they will now have insurance. But they will be taking care of medical problems early, thus preventing more costly treatment later.
- Myth Drugs will be more difficult to get under single payer.
  Wrong – The drug industry would have you believe that there will be less research and development under a single payer system. In fact, much

medical research is currently funded by the National Institutes of Health. Under single payer, this would grow. Also, drugs will be cheaper under single payer. When all patients are under one system, the payer wields a lot of clout. An example, the Veterans Administration gets a 40% discount on drugs because of its buying power. Single payer buying power is the main reason why other countries' drug prices are lower than ours. Now you know why the drug industry is so opposed to single payer.

Organized by the *Foreign Policy Association* (FPA), read further details at **www.fpa.org/great\_decisions**.

The 2017 program is expected to function with two groups, as it did in previous years. For **Group One** only, Course Materials will be distributed at a planning session beginning at 1:00 P.M. on Thursday, January 26, 2017, in the SASCC Oak Room.

Group One is expecting to enroll about forty members. As in past, Group One will meet from 1:00 - 3:00 P.M. on the first and third Thursdays of each month; the first study session will be Thursday, February 2, 2017. Group One sessions will begin in the SASCC's Oak Room, which is a modular classroom. The initial assembly is to view a DVD, provided by the FPA, pertaining to each session's topic. Half of Group One then moves to the Magnolia room. (Dividing into two subgroups facilitates greater individual participation in discussions.)

**Group Two,** which meets in Barnes Hall, at the Saratoga Retirement Community (SRC), is expected to attract about 20 participants. **Group Two's** participants will meet for their first study session also on Thursday,



February 2, 2017 from 2:00 - 4:00 P.M. and will meet for the next eight weeks at the same place and time.

The **cost of** Great Decisions 2017 **is \$35 for an individual and \$45 for a couple sharing a workbook**. The absolute **sign-up deadline is November 30, 2016**. This is so that course materials can be received in time for the first session. Everyone wanting to participate is urged to sign up quickly.


