





Brush Up Your Foreign Policy Knowledge

Attend Great Decisions 2014

Great Decisions is a program created by the Foreign Policy Association (FPA). Great Decisions are sponsored locally by the League of Women Voters (LWV), the American Association of University Women (AAUW), the Saratoga Area Senior Coordinating Council (SASCC), and the Saratoga Retirement Community (SRC).

The topics for this year's eight sessions are:

- Political Islam in Africa
- China's Foreign Policy
- Turkey
- Israel
- Energy Independence
- Economic Statecraft and Trade
- Defense and the Rise of New Technologies
- Food Security and Climate Change

As in prior years, two separate groups will be formed and will meet as follows:

(**Group 1**) eight bimonthly sessions held on the first and third Thursdays of each month from 1:00 to 3:00 pm in SASCC's Modular Oak and Magnolia classrooms. Group 1 will be led by Al and Anne Stewart who will serve as Program leaders also.

(**Group 2**) weekly sessions for eight consecutive weeks from 2:00 to 4:00 pm at the SRC. The first regular session for each group will begin on February 6, 2014. Group 2 will be led by Rosalie Price who also serves as program coordinator for that group.

NOTE: For Group 1 participants only there will be an organizing meeting on January 30, 2014, in the SASCC classroom, at which time course materials will be distributed and volunteers identified to



serve as individual topic leaders. Those interested in leading a particular one of the listed topics are urged to contact Anne or Al Stewart at (408) 358-3177 as soon as possible. Two leaders will be required for each topic to facilitate Group One breaking into subgroups to enable greater individual participation in group discussions.

Early signups for the coming season's program are encouraged. The sign up deadline is November 30, 2013, even though the first of the eight sessions will not begin until February 6, 2014. That deadline is necessary to ensure the receipt of new program workbooks and DVDs from the FPA in time to insure their timely distribution to participants.

The registration fee is \$27.50 per individual and \$37.50 for couples who share a workbook. That is unchanged from last year's prices. Checks should be made payable to Rosalie Price and mailed to her at 14500 Fruitvale Ave, #6110, Saratoga, CA 95070. It is important that you note on your check in which of the two groups listed you wish to participate.

Commonly purchased tea from the grocery store is most likely **BLACK tea**, and the name oolong tea comes from the Chinese term for "black dragon tea." The tea industry uses the term **ORANGE pekoe** to describe a basic, medium-grade black tea. The traditional Japanese tea ceremony involves the ceremonial preparation and presentation of powdered **GREEN tea**.

Many people like Earl Grey tea, which isn't actually **GREY tea** but is named for Charles, the second Earl Grey, who served as Prime Minister of the United Kingdom from 1830 to 1834. **RED clover tea** is an herbal tea made from the dried flowers and leaves of the red clover which is found in the area of Mediterranean Sea. There are also **WHITE** and **YELLOW teas**.

Spanning more than 1000 kilometers from the Black Sea to the Caspian, the Caucasus Mountains lie at a strategic nexus between continents, linking Asia and Europe via the Silk Road. Join David Couzens in this lavish photographic presentation accompanied by original music. We'll visit isolated mountaintop monasteries in Georgia, enjoy the serenity of Lake Sevan in Armenia, and marvel at the magnificent mosques of Baku, Azerbaijan. Copies of David's latest book Images of the Caucasus will be available for purchase.

Photographer, editor, writer, composer, and musician David Couzens has traveled to more than 30 countries as well as to the majority of American states and Canadian provinces. 
