National AAUW is proposing to eliminate AAUW's longstanding requirement that a person hold an Associate or higher degree to qualify for membership. Other votes are required on amendments to the Public Policy Priorities and bylaws, as well as electing candidates for the Board of Directors. Details are on the national website at www.aauw.org/resources/member/governance-tools/national-election/. Voting ends May 17.

**California AAUW** requests your vote on bylaws, Public Policy Priorities for the state, and members for the state Board of Directors. More details can be found on the state website at <u>www.aauw-ca.org/elections-nominations</u>. Voting ends **May 7**. This is a separate vote from the National AAUW vote.

You should have received your individual voter PIN from both national and California AAUW, by email or by letter, with instructions on how to cast your vote.

#### Message from Your Co-President

On Sunday, May 9, we celebrate Mother's Day. In 1870, abolitionist and suffragette Julia Howe wrote the first Mother's Day proclamation asking women everywhere to join in world peace. The American version of Mother's Day was created by Anna Jarvis in 1908 and was nationally recognized



in a 1914 proclamation signed by Woodrow Wilson. Jarvis would denounce the holiday's commercialization and spent the latter part of her life trying to remove it from the calendar.

Countries that celebrate Mother's Day on the second Sunday in May include Australia, Denmark, Finland, Italy, Switzerland, Turkey and Belgium. In Mexico and many parts of Latin America, Mother's Day is celebrated on May 10 each year.

My mother was born in 1913 and died in 2009. Major portions of her life were spent in uncertainties, wars, and great upheavals. She was born in an area we know as Alviso, but was shipped off to a relative in Japan when she was an infant. It was common for the Japanese farmers to let relatives care for their children since they were too poor to farm and care for their children at the same time. My mother was so happy to come back to her family in San Jose. But her happiness was short-lived. She was pulled out of the fifth grade to work on the farm. She was never able to finish grammar school.

She married and moved to Long Beach where my father had a small farm. Just when things were progressing, Pearl Harbor happened. Our family was given two weeks to sell everything including a new tractor. President Roosevelt signed Executive Order 9066 and forcefully moved 120,000 of us Japanese and Japanese Americans to 10 internment camps. Our family went first to Jerome, Arkansas, and after a year we were transferred to an Indian reservation in Gila River, Arizona. The government was bringing German POWs to Jerome. We moved from the swamps of Arkansas to the desert of Arizona. I was 4.5 years old and released from the camp at age 7.5. It must have been a terrible time for my mother, never knowing what would happen to us. We had no home to return to after the camps. In spite of life's challenges and hardships, my mother raised five children and lived to be 96.

What about you and your mother? If your mother passed away, what memories do you have? If she is still living, you are fortunate. I am so grateful for my mother. Every day should be Mother's Day. Mothers sacrificed so much for their children, as I am sure you have for yours.

Happy Mother's Day to all of you!

Francesca felt a lack of community among fellow women students in her courses, so she took the initiative to start and lead the first Women in STEM Club at West Valley College. Although events had to be virtual, she was able to organize several guest speakers in STEM fields and felt that the connections they made were empowering to them at a time they were really needed. She has proven herself to be an intellectually curious and highly motivated student.

**Alexandra Lum** has been accepted to Arizona State University to study Health Science with the goal of becoming a Physician's Assistant. Due to her own health history, she has worked toward a career in the medical field with the goal of helping others. She has a lot of experience as a volunteer helping others, from children to the elderly, in a variety of organizations. She also became a member and coordinator in the AGS Honor Society at West Valley College, where she improved her public speaking and organizational skills. Strong women examples have been important in her life and she is proud to be a recipient of an AAUW scholarship.

**Paula Silva De Oliviera** plans to attend Santa Clara University to continue her studies in Mathematics and Computer Science. She is particularly interested in the field of Aviation Engineering. She has completed many challenging courses in these fields and proven herself an exceptional student with strong leadership skills. She has experience as a volunteer assisting others as well as participating in environmental clean-up events. She is a first-generation immigrant who is pleased to be eligible to take her U.S. Citizen Naturalization test soon. In her life, Paula has had to overcome many difficulties to be able to continue her education thus far.
